CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES
TUESDAY, MARCH 1, 2016 – 3:30 P.M.
CITY HALL - 1737 MAIN STREET
COUNCIL CHAMBERS - 3RD FLOOR

The Columbia City Council met on Tuesday, March 1, 2016 in the 2nd floor conference room at City Hall, 1737 Main Street, Columbia, South Carolina. The Honorable Mayor Stephen K. Benjamin called the meeting to order at 3:33 p.m. and the following members of Council were present: The Honorable Sam Davis, The Honorable Leona K. Plaugh, The Honorable Moe Baddourah and The Honorable Howard E. Duvall. The Honorable Tameika Isaac Devine participated via telephone. The Honorable Edward McDowell, Jr. was absent. Also present were Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager and Ms. Erika D. Moore, City Clerk. This meeting was advertised in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act.

OCTOBER 2015 HISTORIC FLOOD RECOVERY UPDATE – Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager

Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager said there are still impacted areas of our City as a result of the October flood. We have been working tirelessly to develop a responsible plan to approach various funding streams, the internal infrastructure needs and the individual needs for assistance and recovery. She asked Council for direction on the tour that was canceled today. In lieu of that tour and with the positive announcement of almost \$20 million in HUD recovery funding the City is receiving as a direct allocation, we wanted to spend time talking about these funding opportunities. She thanked Council for their advocacy and assistance with obtaining the funding. Our staff is ready to administer those funds and to be very compliant with how we do that over the next 90 days as we develop an action plan.

Ms. Melissa Gentry, P.E., Assistant City Manager for Operations presented photographs of flood damages at the Columbia Canal, the Wastewater Treatment Plant and to personal properties. She reported that 38,000 tons of materials have been collected off the street side. She anticipated that Riverfront Park will open by April 1, 2016. She noted that properties have been rehabilitated, elevated, demolished, gutted or boarded up. She noted that properties that have been elevated have also benefited from the Increased Cost of Compliance (ICC) funding, but properties without flood insurance aren't eligible for ICC funding. She reported that 450 properties were impacted within City limits and approximately 250 building permits have been issued. The National Resources Conservation Service is providing \$770,000 for waterway debris removal and other funding options will be considered. This will require a combined effort between the City of Columbia and Richland County, because the removal of blockages could cause flooding elsewhere. She presented photographs of commercial properties that were impacted by the flood. She noted that commercial property owners have to meet the current zoning code and flood plain regulations. She stated that \$36 million in Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funding is being provided for the state. She presented a listing of proposed projects that will exceed the amount of available Hazard Mitigation funding. The list needs to be prioritized.

Ms. Keely Thibodeaux, AIA, PMP, Principal for Landmark Consulting, LLC explained that the Public Assistance Program is for repairs that are needed to get the City back to where it was at the time of the storm. To date, we have received approximately \$7 million for emergency protective measures and we have since amended the request. She stated that we are still in the planning stage of the program and we have the opportunity to receive a number of funding sources for specific purposes. She noted that some of the funding sources are competitive and some funding requires cost sharing for eligible projects.

Ms. Deborah Livingston, Director of the Community Development Department explained that the Citizens Advisory Committee will receive public input as done with all grant funding plans. She explained that 70% of funding will go to citizens at or below 80% of the area median income. She noted that the guidelines have not been published.

Ms. Teresa Wilson, City Manager said staff must help Council determine how we will approach this.

Mr. Mac Bennett, United Way reported that they have funded \$500,000 into flood relief and they received \$1 million in flood relief funding. He said funding has been provided to non-profit organizations that are active in disaster relief efforts and to the Salvation Army to provide housing for families that have been displaced. He explained that their funding fills the gap where FEMA and insurance doesn't meet the need for repairing homes.

Ms. Deborah Livingston, Director of the Community Development Department explained that the substantial amendment specified that the City of Columbia would work with agencies that could provide funding to people for flood relief. She noted that Home Works deferred their funding to the St. Bernard Project.

Ms. Keely Thibodeaux, AIA, PMP, Principal for Landmark Consulting, LLC reviewed the FEMA funding matrix. She noted that a sources and uses report will be provided regularly.

There was a consensus of Council to schedule the tour of flood impacted areas on Wednesday, March 9, 2016 at 2:00 p.m.

Mayor Benjamin said we would be hard pressed to find a more deserving recipient of this award, which is named after our friend, Steve Morrison whose better half Gayle Morrison is here today. He said the Morrison's contributed to arts, culture and the economic and social fabric of this community; we lost Steve too soon. He said we couldn't be more proud than to recognize our friend, William Starrett.

Mr. William Starrett, Artistic and Executive Director for the Columbia City Ballet said he is honored to receive this award for the second time since its inception. He recognized Steve Morrison's contribution of to the arts, not just ballet.

Ms. Chris Segars, Grants Professional explained that the City of Columbia is applying for \$100,000 for a recreational trails program grant from the South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism. The grant requires a period for public input and it was publicized. The grant is for an ADA accessible connector between the City's esplanade and the Three Rivers Greenway at Riverfront Park.

Council opened the Public Hearing at 6:28 p.m.

No one appeared in support or opposition to the matter.

Council adjourned the Public Hearing at 6:29 p.m.

STAFF REPORT

18. [Water Quality Follow-up Report](#) – Mr. Joey Jaco, P.E., Director of the Utilities and Engineering Department and Mr. Clint Shealy, Waterworks Superintendent

Mr. Joey Jaco, P.E., Director of the Utilities and Engineering Department explained that this is a follow up to last week's meeting to discuss water quality and testing. He recalled that there is a lot of information in the news regarding the lead sampling in Flint, Michigan. He said they will also discuss discolored water and how they plan to address that through the City's Capital Improvement Program.

Mr. Clint Shealy, Waterworks Superintendent assured Council that the City's water is sampled and monitored every day. He noted that routine samples are also collected monthly, quarterly and annually per regulatory requirements, but we go above and beyond those regulations to ensure that our water is safe. We have a DHEC certified laboratory and we conduct over 200,000 samples annually. He said a lot of investment is put into staff and resources for sampling water quality. An annual water quality report is released to customers summarizing the testing results. He referred to the national and local concerns about what is happening in Flint Michigan as reported on February 8, 2016 in the New York Times and about lead tainted water in SC communities as reported in The State on February 19, 2016. In 2005, we were below the EPA action level for lead, but it was other areas that received a letter and not the City of Columbia. We are monitoring what has happened in Flint and we understand what caused that. We are taking measures to safeguard against lead corrosion. We monitored our drinking water before 1992 and we take first draw worst case lead samplings every three years. None of our last samples were above the EPA actions levels. We will also sample water for lead at the request of customers who call the Customer Care Center at 545-3300. Our erosion control is working well and we send out public information notices whenever service lines are down. When we encounter lead service lines they are removed and replaced with poly tubing from the water main to the water meter.

Mr. Joey Jaco, P.E., Director of Utilities and Engineering acknowledged that we have an aged system with aged galvanized pipes that result in red or brown discolored water. We flush the pipes to clear this up. We also address this issue through our Capital Improvement Program by replacing or rehabbing lines. He said trenchless technology is used to line 6” or larger pipes; this process is less evasive. He presented a map of the service area indicating where service calls occurred for discolored water. He said we are dealing with unlined cast iron and galvanized pipes. He said discolored water has occurred in newer developments where the developer installed galvanized service lines. When we find those situations, we replace the lines. We received 1,900 complaints about discolored water over a one year period. The map also depicted areas where older cast irons pipes have been lined and areas where projects are underway or proposed. In the next five years we have \$60 million in projects in the Capital Improvement Program to address water quality and pressure/flow issues. Some of those areas include Earlewood, Booker Washington Heights, Washington Park, and Lake Katherine.

Mayor Benjamin recalled that Council asked staff to look at several neighborhoods that were experiencing discolored water and to look at ways to accelerate the Capital Improvement Projects to either reline or replace iron pipes.

Councilor Duvall said we have a unique opportunity now that we are not transferring funds out of the water and sewer fund to the general fund.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Duvall and seconded by Mr. Baddourah, Council voted unanimously to add the \$2.5 million to the Capital Improvement Program to be used specifically for water quality projects and develop a plan to accelerate the replacement or lining of pipes causing discoloration in the following areas: Booker Washington Heights, Earlewood, Lake Katherine, Midland Terrace, Hollywood Rosehill, Rosewood, Shandon, Wales Garden, Trenholm Road, and North Main. Staff can determine the best use of the \$2.5 million and this policy will be in effect for ten years while the \$750 million in sewer projects are in effect.

Mayor Benjamin said several of these projects have been identified for improvement or replacement already, but this will help us accelerate the replacement or improvement of those lines. He said we will look to staff on guidance as to whether or not we use the cash that has been saved or whether or not be bond some of that money. He acknowledged that there are other neighborhoods that require attention and we will need to monitor this regularly. He asked staff to look at ways to aggressively share this information with the public. He asked the City Manager to determine how to get this information out to the specific neighborhoods.
