## HUD Awards \$157 Million in Disaster Recovery Funds in SC

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Secretary Julián Castro announced on March 1, that \$157 million will be awarded to South Carolina communities for disaster recovery efforts following significant rainfall and flooding in October 2015. The funds will help to meet remaining unmet housing, economic development, and infrastructure needs that resulted from thousands of homes and small businesses being damaged or destroyed.

"After disaster strikes, the most important task is getting folks back to a safe home quickly, so they can return to their daily lives," said Secretary Castro. "With climate change increasing the frequency and intensity of disasters, we must take every opportunity to plan better and ensure faster recovery for communities across the nation. With this \$142 million disaster recovery investment, we uphold our commitment to helping these communities recover stronger and be better prepared for future disasters."

The disaster recovery funds announced will be allocated to the following grantees for long-term disaster recovery efforts:

Congress appropriated \$300 million to address the unmet recovery needs in communities that were most impacted and distressed by a major flooding disaster in 2015. It was determined that communities in South Carolina and Texas, will receive recovery funds due to them having significantly higher unmet needs than jurisdictions impacted by other eligible disasters last year. With these funds, HUD is also encouraging grantees to incorporate resilience

measures into their local action plans to ensure communities are more prepared for the next storm. Since Hurricane Sandy, HUD has taken significant steps to encourage resiliency planning and disaster preparedness in communities nationwide, including the \$1 billion [National Disaster Resilience Competition](#).

HUD allocates CDBG-Disaster Recovery funds based on the best available data from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Small Business Administration disaster loan programs to identify the areas of greatest need in the impacted region. Following a Presidential disaster declaration, CDBG-DR funds may be made available to states, local governments, and insular areas that have significant unmet recovery needs and the capacity to carry out a disaster recovery program.



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# City of Columbia Street Division Wins SCAPA Award



The City of Columbia's Street Division was recently awarded the 2015 Project Delivery Award by the South Carolina Asphalt Pavement Association (SCAPA) for the Columbiana Drive Reconstruction Project.


According to SCAPA, the Project Delivery Award highlights projects that were completed in a timely and efficient manner, and the owner/agency was extremely pleased with the expedited delivery of the project. These projects typically are completed ahead of schedule, constructed with minimal traffic delay and congestion. Additionally, the surrounding businesses and homeowners appreciate the partnering efforts of the contractor and owner to ensure exceptional delivery of the projects.

The Columbiana Drive project took 12 weeks to complete from April through July 2015. The City worked with Lane Construction to ensure there would be no traffic disruptions and the project would not interfere with the businesses. The team held a pre-construction meeting with local business owners to

go over project details and answer any questions. Then, on a weekly basis, the City of Columbia sent an email that provided an overview of work that happened each week and what was planned to be done in the following week.

Lane Construction and the City of Columbia were awarded the 2015 Project Delivery Award for their efforts on the Columbiana Drive Reconstruction. The City of Columbia, Town of Irmo, Columbiana Mall and the numerous businesses in the area worked together with Lane and the City to make a much needed road improvement with minimal business and traffic disruption.

## City Provides Water Safety Update



In light of recent national and local concerns about lead levels in drinking water, the City of Columbia wants to reassure its customers that your drinking water is safe and meets all regulatory standards. In the early 1990s, the U.S. EPA introduced new guidelines for lead levels in drinking water, which took effect in the mid-1990s and was fully implemented by the late-1990s. Since 1998, water leaving City of Columbia customers' taps has consistently met these requirements. Lead levels in the water leaving the City's drinking water treatment plants are normally below detection levels, well below the maximum levels set by the EPA.

The City also actively works to protect customers from lead that might be in their own pipes. Typically, lead in drinking water comes from the water sitting for extended periods of time in lead service lines or homes plumbed with copper pipe and lead based solder. The City's corrosion control efforts create a protective barrier on these lines. "We consider our corrosion control efforts a great success. They have helped us keep lead levels down and have been part of our routine water treatment for almost 20 years," said Clint Shealy, Water Works Superintendent for the City of Columbia. And the few lead service lines that still remain in our system are replaced any time they are discovered.

The City also wants you to know what steps you can take to protect yourself and your family from lead in your drinking water. When water has been sitting in your home plumbing pipes for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by running your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using the water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned that your house may have copper pipes with lead based solder, the City will perform free lead testing.
